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Acute Pain Management Operative Or

The goal of postoperative pain management is to relieve pain while keeping side effects to a minimum. After hundreds of years of advances, the mainstay of pain therapy is still the opioids. While they are very effective analgesics, opioids also carry with them many undesirable side effects: sedation, respiratory depression, nausea and vomiting, hypotension and bradycardia, pruritus, and inhibition of bowel function.

The Acute Pain Management Guideline Panel recommends that any hospital in which abdominal or thoracic operations are routinely performed offer patients postoperative regional anesthetic, epidural or intrathecal opioids, PCA infusions, and other interventions requiring a similar level of expertise, under the supervision of an acute pain service ...

Acute postoperative pain develops into chronic pain in 10% of patients. This is increasingly being recognised, not only for the public health problem it represents, but also because previous approaches to manage this have contributed substantially to the opioid epidemic.

Postoperative pain management and opioids

Inadequate management of acute pain negatively impacts numerous aspects of patient health, and may increase the risk of developing chronic pain. Although opioids are the preferred treatment for most moderate to severe acute pain, their side effects can impede their use, and thus, their clinical effectiveness.

Causes and Consequences of Inadequate Management of Acute Pain

Traditionally, acute perioperative pain management has relied solely on opioid medications to target central mechanisms involved in the perception of pain . A better approach uses several agents, each acting at different sites of the pain pathway, and is known as multimodal analgesia.

A. Definition of Acute Pain Management in the Perioperative Setting. For these Guidelines, acute pain is defined as pain that is present in a surgical patient after a procedure. Such pain may be the result of trauma from the procedure or procedure-related complications.

Managing acute postoperative pain is a major challenge for practitioners, given that more than 80% of patients report pain after surgery, and 75% report the pain as moderate, severe, or even extreme. 1-2 In more than half of cases, patients report not receiving adequate pain management following their procedure, 1 which raises concerns over the development of chronic pain down the line.

Inadequate post-operative pain control can lead to poor recovery, function, and quality of life and can increase the risk of persistent post-surgical pain and complications. 1 With over 80% of surgical patients experiencing acute post-operative pain and approximately 75% of those with post-operative pain reporting the severity as moderate or higher, 2,3 it is important to achieve adequate pain control to minimize suffering, improve patient satisfaction, promote early post-surgical ...

Management of pain involves team work, including acute pain services, especially in dealing with complex problems. Management of pain ideally starts at the pre-assessment visit or from first presentation to the clinician. It is important to anticipate and treat acute pain effectively, which may prevent the development of chronic pain syndromes.
